

The Order of the Diocese of British Columbia

This service is the second investiture of Members and Officers into the Order. The purpose of this honour system is to give special recognition to members of the diocese who have given outstanding service to their parish, the diocese, and/or community over a significant period of time; and in the case of honorary awards, to recognize those beyond our diocese for their work in the wider community in accordance with the ideals of the diocese.

The Insignia

The insignia of the Order is based on the badge of the Diocese of British Columbia, granted by the Chief Herald of Canada in 2017. The design was a collaboration between the Deputy Chief Herald, Bruce Patterson and the Order's first Secretary, The Rev'd Canon Ian Powell. It is a combination of both original and new symbols of the diocese.

The original part is the cross at its centre, which was part of the seal of the first Bishop of the diocese, George Hills, and became part of the diocesan Coat of Arms granted in 1859. The new part is the dragonfly, a symbol that was adopted by the diocese in 2016. First Nations in the Pacific Northwest consider the dragonfly to be a symbol of change, transformation and swiftness, traits the diocese strives towards. It is also respectful of the journey of reconciliation the diocese is in with its First Nations neighbours. The dragonfly was designed for the Canadian Heraldic Authority by Doug LaFortune of the Tsawout First Nation on the Saanich Peninsula. The position of the four dragonflies alludes to the badge of the Anglican Church of Canada, a red cross with maple leaves positioned between the limbs.

The Motto

Faithfulness — This single word has been used to honour the faithful service over a considerable time by the members of the Order to their parish family, The Diocese of British Columbia and the wider church and community. It also acknowledges that our service is rooted in faithful service to the teachings of Christ.


The Anthem
